Definitions:

- Accepted industry practice refers to approved codes of practice and standardised procedures
 accepted by the wider tree felling industries as examples of best practice.
- **Job prescription** (harvesting plan) refers to a detailed description of the tasks, responsibilities, skills, environmental requirements, and expectations associated with a particular role.
- **PPE** refers to personal protective equipment and may include but is not limited to high-visibility, protective clothing, gloves, face and eye protection, safety helmet, footwear, hearing protection, and safety devices.
- Worksite procedures refer to documented procedures used by the organisation carrying out the
 work and applicable to the tasks being carried out. They may include but are not limited to –
 standard operating procedures, site safety procedures, equipment operating procedures, quality
 assurance procedures, housekeeping standards, procedures to comply with legislative and local
 body requirements.
- **Kaitiakitanga**: Signifies guardianship and stewardship, highlighting the responsibility to protect and preserve the natural environment for future generations.
- **Kotahitanga**: Denotes unity and collective action, promoting togetherness and solidarity within the community.
- **Rangatiratanga**: Signifies self-determination and leadership, emphasizing autonomy and the ability to make decisions for oneself or one's community.
