All activities and evidence must meet the requirements of worksite procedures, accepted industry practice, legislation and any subsequent amendments.

All activities relevant to this standard should reflect ngā kaupapa (the principles) o te Tiriti o Waitangi.

All activities must, as relevant to candidates and/or this standard, reflect the peoples of the Pacific and other cultures, and their world views.

Definitions

Categories of welfare indicators – Welfare indicators across different categories. Categories include Physical environment, health, nutritional, behavioural. A mixture of animal-based indicators (e.g., play, socialisation, shivering, panting, coughing, wounds, body condition) and environment-based indicators (e.g., temperature, space allowance, air quality, flooring, feeding space).

Worksite procedures refer to the policies and procedures set out in a verbal or written form by the employer or organisation.

Accepted industry practice refers to approved codes of practice and standardised procedures accepted by the wider industries as examples of best practice.

Categories of behaviour

- Normal and positive behaviour: socialising, play, activity, resting, wallowing, eating, exploring, drinking
- Abnormal/undesirable behaviour: bullying, fighting, tail biting, flank biting, pen soiling
- Physical characteristics: sense of smell, hearing, field of vision, blind spot, point of balance

Low stress and safe handling and restraint

- Planned route ahead of moving ensure clear path, open/close gates, remove distractions
- Move quietly and calmly (Prohand process)
- Use of aides: boards, rattles, paddles, voice
- Restraint: boards, snares, head bail, holding/lifting

Routine husbandry procedures

- Supervision: veterinarian, competent skilled senior stockperson/manager
- Hygiene between pigs, well maintained appropriate equipment in good working order (tail docking, ear tagging, injecting, nose rings/clips, foot trimming, tusk trimming)
- Correct technique
- Adverse reaction/outcomes monitored and addressed (bleeding, swelling, infection)

Pig welfare indicators

- Direct (animal based): body condition, clinical signs, behaviour, posture, lesions
- Indirect (environment/resource based): dunging patterns, water and feed provision, space allowance, air quality, temperature
